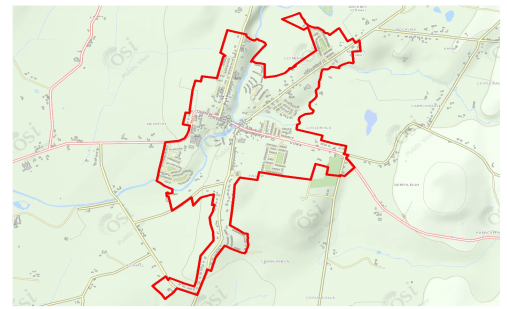


**AREA PROFILE FOR TOWN
NEWPORT CO. TIPPERARY NORTH**



AGE/SEX

In April 2011 Newport had a population of 1,806, consisting of 864 males and 942 females.

The population of pre-school age (0-4) was 225, of primary school going age (5-12) was 239 and of secondary school going age (13-18) was 116. There were 156 persons aged 65 years and over. The number of persons aged 18 years or over was 1,249.

MARITAL STATUS

Of the 1,298 persons aged 15 years and over, 496 were single, 637 were married, 57 were separated, 41 were divorced and 67 were widowed.

LIVING ARRANGEMENTS

There were 653 private households in Newport in April 2011, of which 142 were single person households. Of the 501 families in the area, 129 were couples with no children. The average number of children per family was 1.4 compared with 1.4 nationally.

MIGRATION AND NATIONALITIES

95.8 per cent of the usually resident population aged over 1 lived at the same address one year before the census. A further 1.8 per cent lived elsewhere in the same county, 1.9 per cent lived elsewhere in the State while 0.5 per cent lived outside the State twelve months before the census on April 10, 2011.

Non-Irish nationals accounted for 6.6 per cent of the population of Newport compared with a national average figure of 12.0 per cent. UK Nationals (32 persons) were the largest group, followed by Indians and Filipinos (15 persons each).

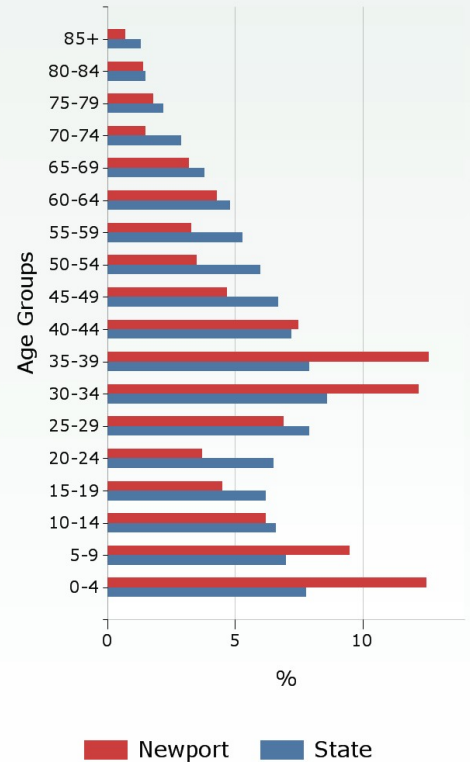
LANGUAGES

732 persons could speak the Irish language and of these 230 spoke the language daily. 109 persons spoke a language other than Irish or English at home and of these 13 could not speak English well or at all. French was the most common foreign language spoken at home with 23 speakers.

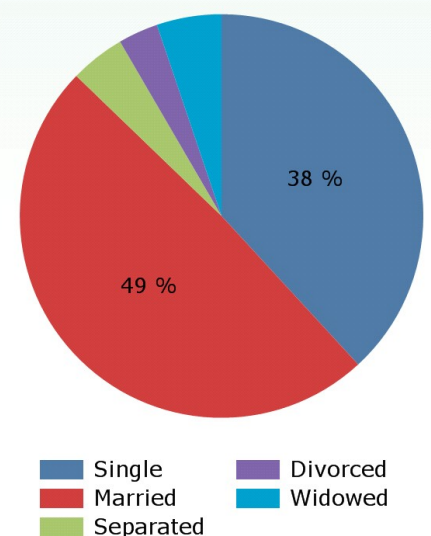
RELIGION

There were 1,637 Roman Catholics in the area at census time. A further 45 were adherents of other stated religions (e.g. Church of Ireland, Islam, Presbyterian, Orthodox), while 61 persons indicated that they had no religion.

LABOUR FORCE

There were 899 persons aged 15 years and over in the labour force and of these, 81.4 per cent (732 persons) were at work. The unemployment rate for this area was 18.6 per cent compared with a national average rate of 19.0 per cent.

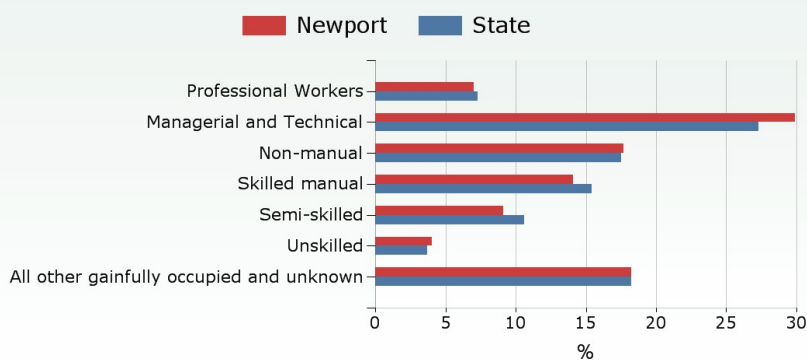
Of the 399 persons aged 15 years and over who were outside the labour force, 28.1 per cent were students, 26.8 per cent were looking after the home/family and 32.3 per cent were retired.

Of the 732 workers enumerated in Newport, 527 worked outside the area. The daytime working population (resident and non-resident) of Newport was 299 with professional services being the largest industry.

EDUCATION

Of those aged 15 years and over whose full-time education had ceased, 12.1 per cent were educated to at most primary level only; a further 54.3 per cent attained second level while 33.6 per cent were educated to third level.

TRAVEL TO WORK

The most popular means of travelling to work was by car (driver) with this mode accounting for 77.9 per cent of all journeys. 5 persons commuted using public transport (bus or rail). The average journey time was 25 minutes and 18.6 per cent of workers faced a commuting time in excess of 30 minutes.

DISABILITY AND CARERS

189 persons had a disability in April 2011, of whom 53, representing 28.0 per cent of the total, were aged 65 years and over.

55 persons (17 males and 38 females) provided regular unpaid personal help for a friend or family member with a long-term illness, health problem or disability. 25.5 per cent of these provided care for more than 6 hours per day.

HOUSING, INTERNET AND CARS

98.4 per cent of households lived in houses or bungalows while a further 1.6 per cent lived in apartments, flats or bedsits. 483 dwellings (74.0 per cent) were owner occupied while 138 dwellings (21.1 per cent) were rented. 53.0 per cent of the dwellings in this area were built in the ten years before the census. The average number of persons per household was 2.8 compared with 2.7 nationally.

64.9 per cent of households had broadband connectivity compared with 63.8 per cent nationally. 49.5 per cent of households had two or more cars.

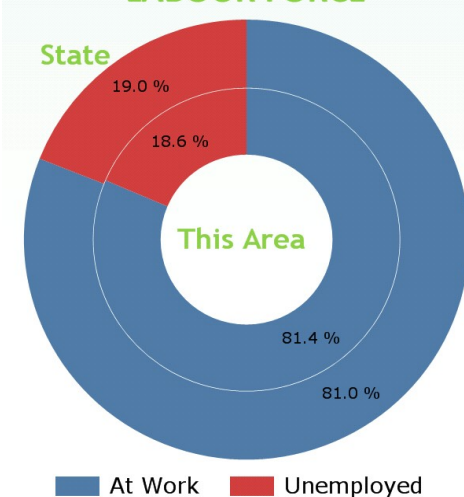
GENERAL HEALTH

In this area 1,597 persons stated they were in very good or good health, representing 88.4 per cent of total persons. This compares to 88.3 per cent of total persons nationally. 17 persons stated they were in bad or very bad health, representing 0.9 per cent of total persons in this area. Again this compares with 1.5 per cent of total persons nationally.
